



CHILD WELLBEING DASHBOARD

INTRODUCTION

TexProtects, in partnership with the nationally-recognized nonprofit research organization Child Trends, explored scientific literature to identify a list of metrics known to provide a comprehensive picture of child wellbeing. Using evidence-informed models such as the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention’s Essentials for Childhood and the National Collaborative for Infants and Toddlers’ Data Guidebook, TexProtects curated and developed an interactive dashboard containing 27 indicators that depict the current state of child wellbeing in Texas and the United States overall. These metrics span two overarching domains and five child welfare themes – economic stability, healthy beginnings, safe and stable caregiver relationships, safety/permanency, and systems to support healing – essential for promoting positive early childhood outcomes, with an emphasis on leading indicators that forecast poor outcomes early in a child’s life.

TexProtects prioritized indicators that aligned with the five child welfare themes and the following criteria:

Relevance – Metrics address important issues that affect the health and wellbeing of young children and their families

Data Availability – Data available at the state-level can be assessed for long-term trends and compared to performance of the US overall

Data Quality – Data for the metrics are complete and accurate

The dashboard incorporates the latest available data from a multitude of national and state level sources, such as the US Children’s Bureau, Texas Department of Family and Protective Services, National Survey of Children’s Health, and State of Babies Yearbook.¹ Data included are from publicly available sources, with TexProtects’ conducting further data analyses for four of the metrics.

Dashboard users can find two levels of analyses to put data into context:

Texas to US Comparison – Difference in performance between Texas and the US overall

Longitudinal Trend – Texas’ performance from a baseline year to most-recent year

Data years vary by indicator based on the data sources. With the exception of three metrics, the baseline year was at least five years, but no more than 12 years, prior to the most-recent data year. Baseline data years ranged from 2010 to 2019. The most up-to-date data years ranged from 2019 to 2022.

DASHBOARD SUMMARY

While Texas performs as well as, or in some cases better than, the national average, these data reveal major gaps in the Texas child welfare system. We think there are several key metrics across the child welfare continuum worth highlighting. These data underscore the importance of increasing services and support available to families early in a child's life in order to prevent the occurrence of child maltreatment, which can lead to negative outcomes over the course of a lifetime.

SAFE AND STRONG FOUNDATION

Economic Stability

19.6 percent of Texas children are living in poverty, compared to the national average of 16.9 percent. Similarly, a larger share of children in Texas (18.9 percent) experience food insecurity in comparison to children across the US (16.1 percent). Texas families are more likely to face high housing cost burden (32 percent) when compared to the US overall (30 percent).

Healthy Beginnings

A larger share of Texas mothers (9.8 percent) receive late or no prenatal care than mothers in the US overall (6.4 percent). Furthermore, Texas children are less likely to have a medical home than the US average (45.6 percent versus 48.3 percent, respectively).

Safe and Stable Caregiver Relationships

Fewer Texas children (27.4 percent) experience high quality parent child interactions compared to US overall (38.6 percent). Less than 2 percent of high priority families in Texas have access to proven home visiting programs, compared to the national average of 3.3 percent.

EMPOWER HEALING

Safety/Permanency

Just one-third of Texas children exit the state's care to reunite with their families, in comparison to nearly half of children across the US (47 percent). A smaller share of children in Texas (29 percent) find a permanent placement within 12 months of removal compared to the national average (35.2 percent).

Systems to Support Healing

A larger share of caregivers in Texas (30.1 percent) lack access to emotional support for parenting when compared to the US overall (23.8 percent). Additionally, six in ten

Texas adults with any mental illness did not receive treatment, in comparison to the national average of 54.7 percent. Similarly, children aged 3-17 with a mental health/behavioral condition in Texas are less likely (43.6 percent) to receive treatment or counseling than the national average (51.6 percent). More children in Texas (18.2 percent) do not have access to a trusted adult compared to the US overall (14.1 percent). Further exacerbating the issue, Texas has a smaller mental health workforce in comparison to overall US mental health workforce capacity (760:1 versus 350:1, respectively).

LOOKING AHEAD

The Child Wellbeing Dashboard lays the foundation for a data-driven platform that will be used to assess the state of child wellbeing in Texas. TexProtects aims to further develop the dashboard and expand its capacities, with a particular interest in elevating prevention-focused outcomes and solutions. Entering phase two of our work, TexProtects invites feedback regarding the dashboard from individuals and organizations involved in child welfare advocacy efforts.
